
Motive: To redress the widespread sexism and patriarchal stronghold in language and social roles propelled by the pandemic situation

Outcome: Dr. Khatun's phenomenal success in reaching out to our students and explaining difficult concepts to them in a language they could understand inspired us to approach her for another programme, this time a webinar, which had become part of the new normal in educational institutions.

This webinar addressed the whirlwind of sexist jokes and stereotypes on Whatsapp and other social media platforms during the early days of the Covid-19 pandemic. While the pandemic had created a space for gender parity within the home, increasingly studies began to show how

women's workload, instead of decreasing, had in fact, increased manifold. Cases of domestic abuse and violence against women within households were also on the rise. This violence was not always physical. The webinar discussed how language and gender stereotypes were tools of epistemic violence against women during the pandemic and the immediate need to redress them.

Motive: To generate awareness about transgender lives, issues, and realities

Outcome: Gender sensitization programmes in educational institutions often remain oblivious to or skirt around sensitive issues like transgender identity. Debojyoti Bhattacharjee (now Dr. Debanjali Bhattacharjee), an erstwhile educator in Udaynarayanpur Madhabilata Mahavidyalaya, had recently transitioned through a gender-affirming surgical procedure. This webinar was like a second homecoming for her. She spoke eloquently to the students and educators, explaining the basics of transgender identity, the LGBTQIA+ community, and gender-affirming surgery. She spoke from personal experience of the travails and segregation that gender-nonconforming persons often have to face in society. Participants in the webinar engaged in an active question-answer session and left convinced about the need to be more sensitive to and raise awareness about this significant social issue.

Intra College Student Debate Competition

Motive: To generate discussions on gender issues through focus on lived experience of students

Outcome: Nearly seventy-five per cent of the students of Udaynarayanpur Madhabilata Mahavidyalaya are young women. They live in or around Udaynarayanpur and often tell us that they would never have been allowed to pursue higher education had this college not existed.

In this seminar, students worked individually and in groups to express their gendered experiences at home and in the world. They flooded us with questions, narratives, songs and poetry. They challenged gendered notions and interrogated beliefs they had been interpellated with since childhood and refused to be mollified by tokenisms in the name of gender equality. They spoke passionately and fluently on women's rights to education; to free choice in matters of attire, employment, marital partners; as well as on the necessity of creating public and domestic spaces more sensitive to issues of gender.

While these concerns may seem elementary in terms of global discourses on gender at present, the contextual realities that emerged out of the students' seminar as well as the responses of our students to its deliberations underscore the absence of even the most basic orientation to

gender issues in villages like Udaynarayanpur. Active student participation ensured the stretching of the event from a stipulated 2 hours to 4 hours! The students' stories and questions days after the event as well as the nuanced shifts we noticed in their negotiations with the space of the college and their readings of texts within the classroom underlined for us anew the profound necessity of Gender Sensitisation Cells and programmes in institutions, particularly so in rural institutions like ours.

The student narratives from the seminar shall be published in the form of an e-book with ISBN.

12-Day Karate Workshop



Event 1: Book Launch



The student narratives from the 'Ami Nari' seminar held in the previous year were edited and compiled by faculty members of the Gender Sensitization Cell, namely, Dr. Sreemoyee Banerjee, Dr. Snehasree Saha, and Rimjhim Bhattacherjee in the form of an e-book titled

Gendered Interrogations: Narratives of Students from Rural Howrah, ISBN: 978-81-954644-3-2. The book was formally launched by the Principal, Dr. Arabinda Ghosh, in the presence of faculty members, staff, and students.

The book has a bilingual structure with student narratives both in English and Bengali. Each narrative has a short introduction penned by Arijit Ghosh and Sourav Denre, ex-students of Udaynarayanpur Madhabilata Mahavidyalaya, who enthusiastically agreed to work as student editors to the volume. While students have written on their own experiences of gender based discrimination within and outside the home, Arijit (for the Bengali section) and Sourav (for the English section) have briefly contextualised the larger issues raised by each of these narratives. The hope is that these gendered interrogations shall contribute to the burgeoning body of local incursions into global gender discourses, aiding in the contextualising of gender issues in the light of rural realities.

Event 2: Cultural Programme: Udaynarayanpur Gatha, Mahilader Katha (The story of Udaynarayanpur in the words of its women)







The local community formed a large part of our cultural programme this year. We got in touch with a local NGO named Ashadeep Foundation to help us organize the event. Through Ashadeep Foundation, the local women of Udaynarayanpur, including some octogenarians, regaled us with stories of Udaynarayanpur's glorious past, its gradual development, and the role of women like Madhabilata Devi (a patron of the institution) in promoting womens' education in the village. They also inspired our students to act as youth leaders and work collaboratively to help their country town grow and develop. The peon of our library, Smt. Mithu Mondal Pramanick, a resident of Udaynarayanpur, also contributed to the event by sharing her stories of the growth and development of her beloved village.

A cultural programme was organised by the students celebrating the rich heritage of womens' education and labour in Udaynarayanpur as well as the rich history of our institution. For this, an original song was composed by Dr. Nargis Nasir, faculty member of the Department of

Music, Udaynarayanpur Madhabilata Mahavidyalaya. The event was a huge success and was attended with great enthusiasm by students, faculty, and staff.

Event 3: Karate Workshop



A one-day karate workshop was organized for the female students of the college as part of this week-long event. The workshop was conducted by Sensei Dhananjoy Paul of the Karate Association of India. The event was principally an awareness-raising programme on basic self-defence techniques for women. The workshop saw such enthusiastic participation that the institution proposed further collaborative workshops with Sensei in our institution in the upcoming years.

Event 4: Student Survey

A questionnaire was distributed to female students of the institution to gain an understanding of the barriers they face towards their pursuit of education. Questions also pertained to college infrastructure and their accessibility to female students.

Analysis of responses of around 100 students revealed that nearly 90% of female students face varied difficulties in attending college regularly including domestic responsibilities, difficulty in travelling, and irregular bus service to college. Within college premises, students had no problems with class teaching or classroom infrastructure. Some concerns were raised regarding the cleanliness of the premises and washrooms as well as the playground. Students were particularly happy with the canteen and the regularity with which classes are conducted in the institution. The general demand was for a speedier wi-fi connectivity for students.

It was also understood from the survey that around 75% of our female students wish to study further after graduation, while preparation for government employment, private-sector jobs, and lives as home-makers comprise the ambitions of the remaining 25%.

The survey gave us a window into the educational experiences of our female students, also providing us with ideas on potential areas of improvement.
